

February 13 - An Educated Resistance

- 10 a.m. Tell Them We Are Rising: the Story of Historically Black Colleges and Universities (2017) Black colleges and universities are a haven for Black intellectuals, artists and revolutionaries and have educated the architects of freedom movements and cultivated leaders in every field. This film examines the impact these institutions have had on American history, culture, and national identity.
- 3 p.m. Twenty Pearls (2021) A powerful story of sisterhood. In 1908, nine Black women enrolled at Howard University made one decision that would change the course of history. These college students created Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated ®.

- 10 a.m. Black Art: In the Absence of Light (2021) At the heart of this
 feature documentary is the groundbreaking "Two Centuries of Black American
 Art" exhibition curated by the late African American artist and scholar David
 Driskell in 1976. The film shines a light on the exhibition's extraordinary impact
 on generations of African American artists who have staked a claim on their
 rightful place within the 21st-century art world.
- 3 p.m. Jean-Michel Basquiat: the Radiant Child (2000) In his short
 career, Jean-Michel Basquiat was a phenomenon. He became notorious for
 his graffiti art under the moniker Samo in the late 1970s on the Lower East
 Side scene, sold his first painting to Deborah Harry for \$200 and became best
 friends with Andy Warhol. Much can be gleaned from insider interviews and archival footage, but it is Basquiat's own words and work that powerfully convey
 the mystique and allure of both the artist and the man.

- 10 a.m. American Experience: The Abolitionists Vividly bringing to life
 the epic struggles of the men and women who fought to end slavery, this film
 tells the intertwined stories of Frederick Douglass, William Lloyd Garrison,
 Angelina Grimké, Harriet Beecher Stowe and John Brown. (LWLC Staff Pick)
- 3 p.m. Mr. Civil Rights: Thurgood Marshall and the NAACP (2014) Civil rights attorney Thurgood Marshall's triumph in the 1954 Brown v. Board of Education Supreme Court decision to desegregate America's public schools completed the final leg of an heroic journey to end legal segregation.

- 10 a.m. The Black Panthers: Vanguard of the Revolution (2015) In the turbulent 1960s, change was coming to America and the fault lines could no longer be ignored cities were burning, Vietnam was exploding, and disputes raged over equality and civil rights. This is the first feature-length documentary to explore the Black Panther Party, and its significance to Black people and to broader American culture.
- 5:30 p.m. The Rebellious Life of Mrs. Rosa Parks (2022) The story of Rosa Parks' radical politics and dedication to activism told through interviews, powerful archival footage and her own words. (Peacock Streaming Platform)

- 10 a.m. Hoop Dreams (1994) Two ordinary inner-city Chicago kids dare to reach for the impossible—professional basketball glory—in this epic chronicle of hope and faith. This revelatory film continues to educate and inspire viewers, and it is widely considered one of the great works of American nonfiction cinema. (LWLC Staff Pick)
- 3 p.m. With Drawn Arms (2020) Tommie Smith, the gold medalist who is known for raising his fist after accepting a medal at the '68 Olympic games in protest of racial inequality, looks back 50 years to the moment that helped define a movement and changed the course of his life forever.

- 10 a.m. Daughters of the Dust (1991) At the dawn of the 20th century, a
 multi-generational family in the Gullah community on the Sea Islands off of
 South Carolina struggle to maintain their cultural heritage and folklore while
 contemplating a migration to the mainland. The first wide release by a Black
 female filmmaker, this film was met with wild critical acclaim and rapturous
 audience response. (LWLC Staff Pick)
- 3 p.m. Paris is Burning (1990) Where does voguing come from, and what, exactly, is throwing shade? This landmark documentary provides a vibrant snapshot of the 1980s through the eyes of New York City's African American and Latinx Harlem drag-ball scene. This film celebrates the joy of movement, the force of eloquence, and the draw of community.

- 10 a.m. How It Feels to be Free (2021) This film takes an unprecedented look at the intersection of African American women artists, politics and entertainment and tells the story of how six trailblazing performers—Lena Horne, Abbey Lincoln, Diahann Carroll, Nina Simone, Cicely Tyson and Pam Grier—changed American culture through their films, fashion, music and politics.
- 3 p.m. Something from Nothing: The Art of Rap Tracing the Rise and Global Influence of Hip-Hop (2012) - The craft. The history. The power. All these elements of the hip-hop movement are discussed with director Ice-T and the legends he interviews. (LWLC Staff Pick)

- 10 a.m. Ida B. Wells: a Passion for Justice (1989) This film documents
 the dramatic life and turbulent times of the pioneering African American journalist, activist, suffragist and anti-lynching crusader of the post-Reconstruction
 period. Ida B. Wells-Barnett was a household name in Black America during
 much of her lifetime
- 3 p.m. The Black Press: Soldiers without Swords (1999) This is the first
 film to chronicle the history of the Black press, including its central role in the
 construction of modern African American identity. It recounts the largely forgotten stories of generations of Black journalists who risked life and livelihood so
 African Americans could represent themselves in their own words and images.

- 10 a.m. Tulsa: the Fire and the Forgotten (2021) One hundred years after the destruction of the Black-owned Greenwood district of Tulsa, Oklahoma, one of the worst incidents of racial violence in U.S. history, residents and descendants examine the history of the 1921 tragedy and its aftermath (LWLC Staff Pick)
- 5:30 p.m. Descendant (2022) Documentary filmmaker Margaret Brown returns to her hometown of Mobile, Alabama to document the search for and historic discovery of The Clotilda, the last known ship to arrive in the United States, illegally carrying enslaved Africans. (Netflix streaming platform)

- 10 a.m. Miss Juneteenth (2020) A former beauty queen and single mom prepares her rebellious teenage daughter for the "Miss Juneteenth" pageant.
- 3 p.m. The Apollo (2019) This film chronicles the legacy of New York City's landmark Apollo Theater, covering the rich history of the storied performance space over its 85 years. What began as a refuge for marginalized artists emerged as a hallowed hall of black excellence and empowerment.
